Instructions to Authors

Authors are strongly encouraged to submit their papers electronically. Details on the submission process will become available on the ACISP04 Website (<http://www.ics.mq.edu.au/acisp04>). The paper must be anonymous. The paper should be in one of the following formats: **Postscript** or **PDF** (Portable Document Format). Authors who are unable to submit electronically are invited to send a cover letter and 10 copies of their anonymous paper (double-sided copies preferred) to one of the Program Co-Chairs at the postal address below. The paper should be sent by airmail and be received by the deadline (or postal marked by 10 February 2004). Submissions are limited to 15 pages of 11-point type with reasonable margins excluding bibliography and appendices. Committee

members are not required to read appendices. The paper should not have been previously published or submitted in parallel for publication to other conferences or workshops with proceedings.

Best student paper award

A prize of A\$500 will be given to the author(s) of the best student paper (or split between more than one papers if there is a tie). A paper is eligible if the student(s) is/are the principal author(s), and full-time student(s) at the time of submission. This must be indicated when the paper is submitted and details will become available on the ACISP04 Website.

Conference proceedings

Conference Proceedings will be published in Springer-Verlag's Lecture Notes in Computer Science series and will be available at the conference. The instructions about the final version of the papers will be sent to the authors of accepted papers.
